This table presents types of nouns in one possible order of instruction. Nouns should be taught and practiced over the course of many grade levels.

Irregular Plural Nouns	Nouns whose plural form is not made by adding - <i>s</i> or - <i>es</i>	foot/feet; tooth/teeth; man/men; woman/women; mouse/mice; child/children; fish/fish
Proper Nouns	 Names for a particular person, place, or thing Capitalized Includes names of days, months, holidays, products, teams, organizations, and geographic locations. Possessive Nouns	 Nouns that show ownership, or "who owns it" For singular nouns, both common and proper, add 's. For plural nouns ending in an s, add an apostrophe only. For collective nouns or irregular plurals not ending 	boy's coat, boss's coat, Kareem's coat, Agnes's coat boys' coats, plants' stems children's coats, mice's fur
Collective Nouns	in an <i>s</i> , add <i>'s</i> . A name for a group of people or animals	family, class, team, group, flock, herd

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
